AP/EN 1201 6.0A (SU) The Literary Imagination

Description: In Literary Imagination, students will read a range of imaginative works while

learning the critical skills needed for the study of English literature and other humanities subjects. Course texts include Gothic short stories, a children's fantasy, a metafictional play, illuminated poetry, a "modest proposal" that endorses cannibalism, a novella (and subsequent film adaptation) about birds that attack people, famous speeches, detective fictions and parodies, and two graphic novels. Together we will analyse fiction and non-fiction and works that blur those categories. We will examine the interplay of the verbal and visual in texts and ask how form affects content. We will explore the various strategies (narrative, rhetorical, and other) that the creators of our texts use to awaken the imaginations of readers. We will also consider how authors experiment within inherited forms and adapt, rewrite, or otherwise re-imagine previous works and

Students will learn how to analyse literary, visual, and audio-visual texts. They will learn how to incorporate close textual analyses into tightly-crafted argumentative essays. By the end of the course, they will know how to find, use,

and cite research sources and format essays according to the guidelines of the

Modern Language Association.
