Description: This course will explore a selection of (broadly defined) literary and critical texts

as an introduction to the literary imagination in English. We will learn about the formal and technical foundations of literature, and consider their function across a broad array of texts, including drama, poetry, fiction, and film, as well as pop culture, graphic novels, and social media. We will also consider a range of critical and cultural essays in order to historicize and better understand the idea of "the literary" itself. We will emphasize critical skills in reading, reasoning, and writing, and will cover the basics of critical essay writing, including primary and secondary

research, essay structure, and citation.

The course structure includes a two-hour lecture session each week with the full class, as well as a one-hour tutorial session in smaller groups. Attendance in both lectures and tutorials is mandatory. The lecture sessions will introduce and explore key concepts, and will contextualize and expand upon course readings, using lectures, power point, and videos, along with class discussions, group activities, and in-class assignments. Please note: this is a reading intensive course, and it is absolutely crucial that students complete all assigned readings prior to attending lectures each week. The tutorial sessions will build on lectures with additional activities and discussions designed to further explore course material and deepen student engagement. The tutorial sessions will also be used to introduce and practice the research and writing skills that are central to literary studies, including essay writing, primary research gathering, and MLA citation style.
