Description: During what is commonly known as Romantic Period in England (loosely falling

within the last quarter of the Eighteenth Century and the first thirty years of of the Nineteenth Century), dynastic, economic, and social struggles spanned much of the globe. Radical responses in philosophy and the arts were inevitable and varied. This course will examine the ways that British literary arts registered, contributed and responded to changes in global political philosophy, particularly

as those changes reflected human rights and liberty, in the century which followed. Readings will include non-fiction (including autobiographies, essays, and polemic tracts) and creative works (poetry, two novels, and some other arts).
