AP/EN 1102 6.0A (SU) Literature and Health

Course Director: Dr. Marilou McKenna

**Description:** This course will introduce students to a range of health-related issues as

represented in literature, including accounts of good health and bad, tales of

disease, and explorations of perceptions and moods affected by varying

psychological states, both as they reflect the health status of individuals, and as they comment on social and institutional sickness (eg., the pathology of war). We

will explore a variety of authors and time periods as well as diverse genres (poetry, prose, fiction, and memoir). The course focuses on the intersection of literature and health, both from the perspective of literature's ongoing interest in health issues, and from the perspective of understanding these issues by

appreciating their expression (and learning how to analyze it) in literature. After

a general introduction, the course pro-ceeds to examine texts within a series of thematic units, including "domestic ailments," "plagues and nightmares,"

"physician-writers," and "cross-cultural medicine and healing."
