> This course provides a selective overview of major concepts, problems, contexts, events, genres, and writers in Indigenous North America, New Zealand, Africa, the Caribbean, and South Asia, writing in English from the last decade of the 20th

century through 2018.

Although lectures will provide students with an overview of the literary history, the focus of this course is on contemporary literature, on writers writing today. Because these literatures comprise an immense and diverse expanse of cultures, voices, styles, positions, geographical differences, and kinds of writing, no single course can possibly represent the fullness of their literary expression. Since many writers from these regions have relocated to other countries, this course highlights the many transnational affiliations between and among all national literary traditions.

Organized by area and genre, this course introduces students to popular genre fiction, including science fiction, speculative fiction, fantasy, crime/detective fiction, comics/graphic novels, as well as literary non-fiction, poetry, drama and film. We question the distinctions often made between high (or literary) fiction and popular, middle-brow, or low-brow literature. How do these distinctions reproduce cultural and social relations of power? Finally, this course introduces students to the tools and skills necessary for conducting research in, and writing criticism of, these literary and film genres.

*Students will be evaluated on the quality and quantity of their contributions to tutorial discussion, their abilities to articulate theses and discussions questions consistent with the purpose and themes of the course, to stay on topic, and to advance logical and coherent arguments. Online discussions constitute 70% of the overall participation grade. Weekly discussion questions will be posted during the online portion of the course. Students are expected to formulate and post thoughtful arguments in response to those questions. Students may be excused without penalty from submitting no more than two postings to online discussion forums. Although we continue to read, the Winter Term will be more writing-intensive, allowing students to hone their research and writing skills in preparation for writing the final research essay.
