Description: This course introduces a wide generic range of British literature presented in

historical context. We begin with medieval writings by Marie de France and Geoffrey Chaucer and conclude with modern works by John Cleese, Graham Chapman, and Carol Ann Duffy. Historical accounts and non-canonical writings will supplement more traditional fare. The platform for this course is traditional:

weekly attendance at both lectures (2 hours weekly) and tutorial (1 hour weekly)

is strongly recommended for student success.

Course Objectives include the honing of skills in critical reading, course-specific

research, and coherent communication in tests, quizzes & essays. MLA Handbook style is required for all formal essays; some in-lecture/in-tutorial

discussion of MLA format will be part of early classes
