Description: Literary nonfiction (creative nonfiction, literary journalism, new journalism,

personal journalism, the "fourth genre") has become increasingly popular since the 1960s. At its most achieved, the genre melds the factual accuracy of journalism with the dramatic force of fiction, the best of expository prose with

the readability of the novel or the short story. The genre raises interesting critical

and ethical questions in the tensions between artistic creativity, authorial

perspective and the reporter's objectivity.

In this course we will examine many of the best and most representative examples of the long-form genre (book-length and long essays), primarily American writers, starting with Truman Capote's seminal "non-fiction novel," *In Cold Blood*. Other authors include George Orwell, Joan Didion, John Hersey, James Baldwin and James Agee. In the second term, we will look at recent innovations in the genre including graphic nonfictions and online publications. Students will be encouraged to submit one assignment written in keeping with the genre.

For each primary reading several secondary sources will be provided, available electronically via the course wiki. Critics may include: Tom Wolfe, Masu'd Zarvarzadeh, Patrick Sharp, T.V. Reed, Hayden White, John Hellmann, Suzanne Del Gizzo, Barbara Harrison, Amy Malek, Bosío Davis
