Description: This course is an introduction to the writing of poetry and prose fiction. It is

designed to acquaint students with the possibilities of these forms, to help them explore the writing/editing/reading processes, and to discover their talents.

Students will be expected to satisfy a number of assignments relating to both

fiction and poetry.

Course discussions will raise issues regarding the imagination, creativity, genre, the writing process, and the writing life; course readings are intended as models

that students read while preparing assigned exercises; and course exercises are the heart of the course's writing. Readings should be read before writing the

weekly assignment so that you can observe and discover techniques, devices and

approaches. Students must work actively to link these course elements.

The main focus of the course will be the student's own writing through frequent written assignments and readings. The larger context and traditions of these assignments and discussions is found in the weekly discussions and through assigned readings. Students are expected to improve and polish their work and to develop an appreciation for, and an understanding of, different approaches to

writing.

If you require a computer to take notes, your computer must ONLY be used for the purposes of taking notes and/or participating actively in the course. Any other usage during class time is prohibited.
