Description: During the socio-political and religious turbulence of the Early Modern period,

Englishwomen from wide class and experiential backgrounds found increasing opportunities to express their concerns and interests through writing. Mindful of

the society and culture in which these texts arose, this course will examine generically various texts in English by women of the era. Our theoretical apparatus will include close reading, feminist historicism, and social criticism. Authors to be considered include a queen, noblewomen, and women from the merchant and "middling" ranks; we consider polemic, dramatic, prose fiction,

and poetic works, as well as such less-familiar genres as the mother's legacy. Course objectives include the honing of skills in critical reading, course-specific

research, and coherent communication in seminars and essays.
