**Description:** Gothic horror, the critic Clive Bloom tells us, is about "that which should not be,

whose comprehension is the end of the sanity and the opening of the abyss." In other words, the gothic is about forbidden knowledge - scientific, occult, or personal - and its effects on the human psyche. In this course we will study

several of the many iterations of the gothic, beginning with

Horace Walpole's The Castle of Otranto - a tale of ghostly hauntings and family secrets which first laid the groundwork of the genre. We will continue with two other major gothic authors: Mary Shelley and Edgar Allan Poe. Afterwards, we will discuss, every week, a new gothic theme - from vampires to witches, and from ghosts to doubles - before concluding with another haunted house

narrative: Shirley Jackson's The Haunting of Hill House. Along the way we will also

learn some important concepts, such as the abject, the uncanny and the abhuman. Throughout the course we will study the man characteristics of the

gothic as well as what accounts for its

remarkable endurance and flexibility. We will also examine how the gothic has been used in the last two centuries to give voice to a variety of personal, social

and cultural anxieties.
