Description:	In this intensive course, we will explore the Decadent movement of the late nineteenth century and its associations with sensuality, artificiality, moral degeneration, and "art for art's sake." We will study the British writers' debts to French Symbolism and Gothicism, the influence of the "fleshly school" of poets, Walter Pater's theorization of aestheticism, and the decadentism and dandyism of Oscar Wilde. Course topics include the Decadent writers' provocative interrogation of gender, the role of the Decadent press (especially the scandalous fin-de-siècle journal, <i>The Yellow Book</i>), and the assaults of anti-Decadent criticism and parody. By the end of the term, students will be familiar with the principal figures of British Decadence and the features and contexts of their writings.
