AP/EN 2174 3.0M (W) Twentieth-Century Children's Literature

Description:

This course is a study of children's literature during the twentieth century. Our reading list includes a broad generic range of writing by, for, and about children, from L. Frank Baum's Wonderful Wizard of Oz to J. K. Rowling's Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone. Our approach is academic: we explore a variety of critical approaches to the works on our reading list, taking into account such issues as cultural context and audience. The delivery mode of this course is 2 hours of lecture + 1 hour of tutorial, weekly. Regular attendance in both fora is vital to success: unannounced quizzes and other on-the-spot assignments will be held in lectures or tutorials. Teaching team members are available in posted office hours during the term: students are encouraged to visit during these times for assistance.

Students must stay abreast of all readings and should prepare for classes by bringing relevant texts and materials with them. If there are syllabus changes, students will be advised as soon as possible. Check for weather closures, but if the university is open the class will run as scheduled. **Readings must be completed before the date on which they appear in our syllabus.**
