Description:	This course will explore a selection of (broadly defined) literary
	and critical texts by contemporary Canadian writers over the past
	two decades. Working across genres and contexts, we will emphasize the close reading of literary texts, attending to formal,
	aesthetic, and critical concerns. We will also historicize our
	readings, and explore the contested politics of contemporary
	Canadian literary studies itself. <i>Who</i> or <i>what</i> constitutes Canadian
	literature, and why does it matter? What is "CanLit," and how
	does it differ from "literature in Canada"? What does the study of
	literature within a national frame enable, and what does it limit?
	We will also take time to build and sharpen the research, writing,
	and presentation skills that are central to literary studies.
	This is an online course, which will not have any set meeting time.
	Instead, I will be positing the week's course material on our
	moodle site at the start of each week. This material will include
	weekly lectures (video or audio) with accompanying power-point slides, along with a range of links, short activities, and discussion
	board prompts. Working your way through the class's weekly
	material – listening to the lectures, following the links, and
	completing the brief activities and discussion board responses –
	should take roughly 3hrs per week, and can be completed Monday
	through Thursday.
	Students are expected to compete the week's assigned readings
	<i>prior</i> to working their way through the week's posted material.
	In addition to regular weekly virtual office hours during which I
	will be available for individual meetings, we may hold several
Catanana	open Q&A sessions via Zoom throughout the course.
