We'll think about why literature might be important and how we can use literature to understand and even change the world.</p> <p>Readings will include a range of different types of writing, including novels, poetry, plays, hip-hop, and comics.</p> <p>Students will also have the opportunity to interact with a major Canadian playwright who will be joining us via Zoom to discuss their work. This would be of particular interests to students who are pursuing drama or creative writing.</p> <p>This course will also introduce students to the fundamentals of studying literature and prepare them for further studies in literature.</p>
