	Students may already be familiar with contemporary uses of this		
	technique in such things as mash-up songs, Quentin Tarantino		
	movies, Family Guy, hip-hop, and novels like <i>Pride and Prejudice</i> ,		
	and Zombies.		
	In this course we'll learn how the technique of mixing different		
	texts, different forms, and different genres developed through		
	the history of literature and how it has influenced the way that		
	we use language today in everything from facebook to fan fiction.		
	Students will also have the opportunity to interact with a major		
	Canadian playwright who will be joining us via Zoom to discuss his		
	play <i>Poor Superman</i> , and the way that he drew upon a comic		
	book superhero to write a play about contemporary issues. This		
	would be of particular interests to students who are pursuing		
	drama or creative writing.		
	This course will also help students develops skills for studying		
	literature and prepare them for further studies in literature.
