Description:	An introduction to the formal techniques and generic patterns that have governed the production of prose narrative in English from the 16th century to the present. Primary emphasis is on fiction but non-fictional narrative is addressed as well. We shall be looking at various formal techniques of prose fiction, especially in relation to narration and to plot forms. We shall be considering works in English from several countries, centuries, and cultures. These works centrally exemplify various genres of fiction, including novel, prose romance, short story, and tale; and of non-fiction, including autobiography, narrative essay, and travel literature. Other genres to be examined include allegory, comic novel, Gothic fiction, metafiction, satire, slave narrative, tragic novel. We shall also examine some works which are generic hybrids or generically ambiguous.
