Description:	EN3410 concentrates on some of the poetry, short stories and novels of the British Caribbean as well as essays written by a few of the authors. Postcolonial theory and its applications to literature are often contested terrain. The course looks at how the literature negotiates representations of gender, race, class, sexual politics, marginalization, and other issues. EN3410 also explores the ways in which the master narrative and language of England are challenged and de-constructed in Caribbean literature and re-worked as 'nation language'. In addition, Caribbean film and videos have become an important part of the narrative discourse and the course will include showings of <i>Dance Hall Queen</i> and <i>Bazodee</i> .
