Description:	This course surveys the literature from Africa, with a focus on works written in English and some influential translations. The texts are chosen to show the regional particularities, as well as the social, historical, and aesthetic contexts that shape the literature and its reception. These contexts include colonialism, anti-colonial struggles, globalization, population dispersals, the emergence of Afropolitanism, and contemporary articulations of identity. Poetry, fiction and drama are analyzed to reveal the consequences of the writers' choices of form, style and theme. The course sensitizes students to the extrinsic and intrinsic dimensions of literature that inform critical response. The class format is a combination of lectures and discussion. The lectures introduce and demonstrate the contextual, critical, formal and interpretive frameworks that are applied to the course material. Students have an opportunity to test their ideas through written and oral responses to the various texts.
